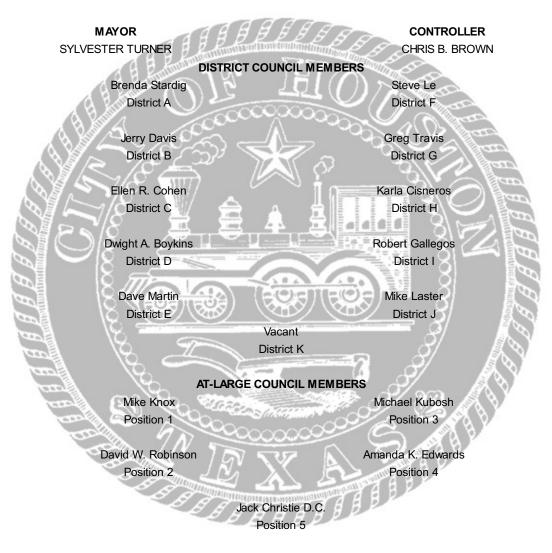

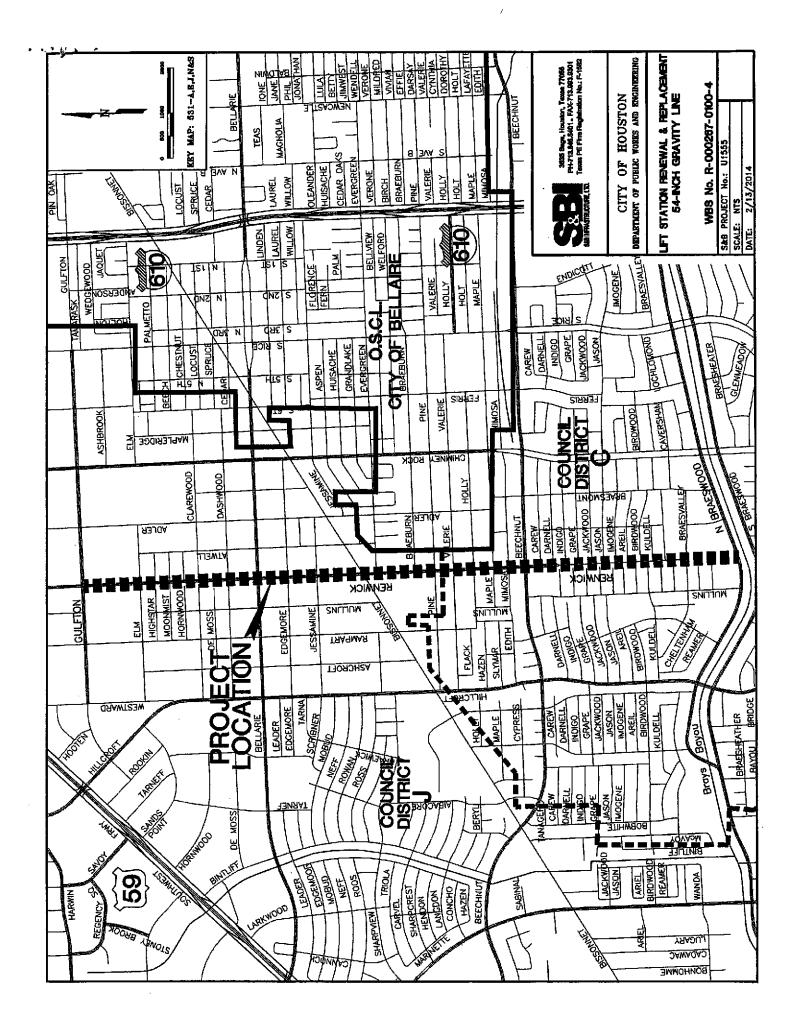

# **Background:**

This amendment allows for the transfer of \$87,381.00 in Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery 2.2 (CDBG-DR2) funds from the project delivery activity to engineering/architectural services to increase the overall construction budget from \$1,373,518.00 to \$1,460,899.00. No additional Authority or City funds will be contributed. The increase is needed to facilitate completion of Phase II of the tunnel project, update the scope of work, and provide construction management oversight.

On December 10, 2014, Council approved the allocation of \$11,986,000.00 million in CDBG-DR2 infrastructure funding for a Near Northside drainage improvement project that included Phase I reconstruction of the Judge Hernandez Tunnel. On April 19, 2017, Council amended the CDBG-DR Grant Agreement to fund Phase II improvements, which will take place on North Main Street from Brooks Street to 245 feet south of the Hernandez Tunnel. The proposed improvements include pavement resurfacing consisting of the top two inches of the asphalt pavement, concrete wall surface repairs, pedestrian railing replacements, graffiti removal, anti-graffiti coating, cleaning and sealing joints and cracks, and a safety lighting and warning system.

The Authority agrees to assign a Construction Manager to manage and oversee Phase II construction, including advertising and bidding the project, contract award preparation, and inspection oversight. The City will assume ownership, maintenance, and repairs upon completion and acceptance of the project. As an additional community benefit, a mural on both sides of the southern entrance will be designed and the installation managed by the Greater Northside Management District.

Construction is scheduled for July 2018 – December 2018. The term of the Agreement shall end on the date of Project completion, as determined by the City's agreement with the GLO, as amended, unless terminated as provided in the Agreement.

# **Background:**

The Houston Health Department (HHD) requests City Council approval of an ordinance approving and authorizing an increase to the maximum contract amount of a contract between the City of Houston and the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston for Routine HIV Screening services from \$118,501.00 to \$275,475.87. The term of the contract is from date of countersignature to December 31, 2018.

Under this contract The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston provides routine HIV opt-out screening services at area Memorial Hermann Hospital System emergency rooms. The routine screening program increases HHD's capacity to test the general population and screen those that may not normally be tested. The target population includes all individuals accessing emergency services within the Memorial Hospital system, ages 18-65. The existing protocol is ACTS (Assess, Consent, Test, Support). Once a newly-positive individual is identified, HHD will ensure follow-up including notification of results, performance of Partner Counseling and Referral Services as well as linkage to HIV primary care services. In 2015, 99,462 individuals were tested. Of those, 1059 were HIV positive and received the follow-up services.

This contract was amended in December of 2016 to extend the term for one year. At that time, the maximum contract amount was inadvertently increased by \$39,500 in SAP, however this increase was not included in the ordinance and therefore not approved.

HHD is including the \$39,500.00 in the new maximum contract amount. HHD does not receive the Notice of Award (NOA) from the CDC until mid-December or later which does not allow enough time to certify the funds and place the item on the agenda before the contract expires on December 31. In the future HHD will request that the contract contain a clause to extend the termination date on the contract by 90 days. This will enable HHD to receive the NOA from the CDC, certify the funds and seek City Council approval before the contract expires.

# **SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:**

The Chief of Police of the Houston Police Department (HPD) recommends that City Council approve an ordinance authorizing a form Agreement to amend and restate the freeway towing agreements of the SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> Freeway Towing and Emergency Road Service Program and authorizing the Mayor and Chief of Police to sign the amended form agreements.

The SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> Program was implemented in 2005 to remove wrecked, stalled or other police towed vehicles from the City's freeways in a safe and expedited manner. From 2005 until 2011, motorists whose vehicles stalled or were disabled on the shoulders of the freeways were towed to a nearby safe place at no charge, with funding provided by the City. In 2015, the City of Houston

entered into new agreements with selected tow operators to participate in the SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> Program. However, no money was appropriated or allocated by the City to pay for these tows; the stalled vehicle owners were responsible to directly pay the SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> operator for the tow at a rate of \$60 per tow as regulated by City Ordinance.

The Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) proposes to enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement with the City of Houston to use a Federal Highway Administration grant from the Texas Department of Transportation to provide free towing services again for certain vehicles stalled on freeways within the City of Houston. The City will provide towing services by using current SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> operators. SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> operators will be paid per tow using the grant funds from the H-GAC Intergovernmental Agreement. The fees paid to each SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> operator will be determined by the number of qualified tows and may vary for each SafeClear<sup>TM</sup> operator. The H-GAC grant will also reimburse for the City's costs of administration of the stalled vehicle towing program. S49-H26315 - Approve an ordinance awarding a sole source contract to Amadeus Airport IT Americas, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$235,061.45 for the renewal of PROPworks software maintenance and support services for the Houston Airport System.

# **Specific Explanation:**

The Director of the Houston Airport System and the Chief Procurement Officer recommend that City Council approve an ordinance awarding a sole source contract to **Amadeus Airport IT Americas**, **Inc**. in an amount not to exceed **\$235,061.45** for the renewal of PROPworks software maintenance and support services **for a 60-month period for** the Houston Airport System (HAS). The Chief Procurement Officer may terminate this contract at any time upon a 30-day notice.

The renewal of the maintenance and support service is imperative to keep HAS's software application operational. As part of the contract, HAS will receive software updates, patches, telephone and web based support services required to maintain the PROPworks software application. PROPworks is a property and revenue management system designed specifically for airports and is currently used by the HAS Finance Division. It is used for tracking all revenue generated through the use of HAS resources by tenants and provides for the billing of tenants based on this usage as well as providing reports related to the revenue billing associated with the tenants. Additionally, it tracks statistical information such as cargo weights, passenger counts and landings. The application is designed to reduce cost, optimize cash flow, and improve operational efficiencies.

Amadeus Airport IT Americas, Inc. is the proprietary owner, developer, manufacturer, supplier and distributor of the licensed PROPworks software application and as such, Amadeus is the sole authorized provider of the PROPworks software implementation service, maintenance, support and consulting services. Therefore, no third parties are permitted under any circumstances to offer software maintenance and support services of the application as provided by the contractor.

This recommendation is made pursuant to Chapter 252, Section 252.022 (a) (7) (A) "a procurement of

items that are available from only one source, including: items that are available from only one source because of patents. copyrights. secret processes. or natural monopolies" of the Texas Local

Government Code for exempted procurements.

### Background:

#### Background:

<u>Subject:</u> Sixth Amendment to the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team, a joint venture between CH2M Hill Engineers, Inc. and CDM Contractors Inc. for the Northeast Water Purification Plant (NEWPP) Expansion Project, Early Work Package 2A Construction (EWP2A); WBS No. S-000065-0005-3 and S-000065-0005-4.

**<u>Recommendation</u>**: Adopt an ordinance approving the Sixth Amendment to Ordinance No. 2015-1260, dated December 9, 2015, for the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team, a joint venture between CH2M Hill Engineers, Inc. and CDM Contractors, Inc. for the Northeast Water Purification Plant (NEWPP) Expansion Project and appropriate funds.

<u>**Project Notice/Justification:**</u> This project is required to meet regulatory mandates of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and the Harris-Galveston Subsidence District Groundwater Reduction Plan.

Under the second supplements, approved on February 18, 2015, under Ordinances No. 2015-137, 2015-138, 2015-139, and 2015-140, between the City and Authorities, the City will be responsible for approximately 16% of the total cost for the NEWPP expansion, and the Authorities will be responsible for the remainder. It is intended that the NEWPP expansion be completed in two phases. The first phase of 80 million gallons of water per day will be substantially complete no later than August 31, 2021 and the second phase of 240 million gallons of water per day to be substantially complete no later than June 30, 2024 for a total of 320 million gallons of water per day. This project was described and briefed to the Transportation, Technology, and Infrastructure (TTI) Committee on December 11, 2017.

**Description/Scope:** The planning and design phase determined that some of the construction work would be completed as Early Work Packages to meet project milestones. EWP2A consists of the construction of the West Filter Module 1 structure, the 84-inch combined filter effluent piping from the filter module structure to the Transfer Pump Station 1 (TPS1), and the TPS1 structure.

Location: This project is located at 12121 North Sam Houston Parkway East, in Humble, Key Map Grids 376 Z & 377 W.

<u>**Project History and Scope:**</u> City Council approved the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team (HWT) on December 9, 2015 under Ordinance No. 2015-1260 appropriating \$3,288,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 1 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on November 16, 2016 under Ordinance No. 2016-875 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$14,950,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 2 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on March 29, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-231 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$3,000,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 3 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on May 24, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-378 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$66,300,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 4 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on December 19, 2017 under the Ordinance No. 2017-1017 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$37,339,594.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 6 to the Design-Build Agreement was initiated in July 2017 when the HWT requested interested construction companies to complete a prequalification package for Early Work Package 2A (EWP2A). HWT reviewed those qualifications and sent a Request for Proposal to three major subcontractors including Alberici Constructors, Kiewit Water Facilities South, and McCarthy Building Companies. Competitive Sealed Proposal method was used to procure the contractor for EWP2A. HWT evaluated each proposal independently. Each contractor was then interviewed by HWT with the City and an Authority

representative as observers. Following the interviews, HWT and the City convened for a final evaluation and scoring of the proposals on a consensus basis. McCarthy Building Companies, Inc. (McCarthy) was chosen as the major subcontractor to perform the work for EWP2A.

**Project Cost:** The total Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) of \$45,515,774.00 includes the direct construction cost of \$34,137,536.00 for EWP2, the indirect construction cost of \$9,671,361.00, and a management reserve of \$1,706,877.00. The major items for indirect construction costs include the cost of \$887,156.00 for the performance and payment bonds, the cost of \$861,304.00 for the engineering services during construction, and the cost of \$3,948,000.00 for the construction allowances for items currently under design.

The City of Houston's total contribution is \$5,052,646.32. The Water Authorities will contribute \$40,463,127.68.

**Pay or Play Program:** The proposed contract requires compliance with the City's 'Pay or Play' ordinance regarding health benefits for employees of City contractors. In this case, the consultant provides health benefits to eligible employees in compliance with City policy.

#### M/WBE Information:

a. **M/WBE-Construction:** The Capacity Study performed for EWP2 showed an 8% capacity for M/WBE participation for direct construction costs. Currently, the proposed amount of participation from the Design-Builder (Houston Waterworks Team) is 11.55%.

b. Included in the indirect costs is the construction allowance of \$3,948,000.00 for items that are in the design phase such as the expansion of Waterworks Way Boulevard, the purchase of additional lime treated soils, additional flowable concrete, additional rebar, and the purchase of Permeability Reducing Admixture Hydrostatic (PRAH). When the design is complete, the Project Director will authorize the use of these funds for construction. However, although the final amount for construction is not yet determined, it is anticipated that the construction and purchase of the allowance items will increase the M/WBE participation for direct construction costs.

c. Early Work Package 1 (EWP1) was approved on December 19, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-1017 with an M/WBE goal of 80.45% of the direct construction costs. Construction has recently commenced and M/WBE data is not available yet.

d. Early Work Package 4 (EWP4) is scheduled to be on Council Agenda on February 21, 2018 and has an M/WBE goal of 15% of the direct construction costs. Construction has not commenced and M/WBE data is not available yet.

e. M/WBE-Design: The status of the design for this project is 30% complete. The original contract amount previously appropriated to design this project totals \$85,134,000.00. The consultant has been paid \$23,835,693.60(28%) to date. Of this

Subject: Sixth Amendment to the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team, a joint venture between CH2M Hill Engineers, Inc. and CDM Contractors Inc. for the Northeast Water Purification Plant (NEWPP) Expansion Project, Early Work Package 2A Construction (EWP2A); WBS No. S-000065-0005-3 and S-000065-0005-4.

**Recommendation:** Adopt an ordinance approving the Sixth Amendment to Ordinance No. 2015-1260, dated December 9, 2015, for the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team, a joint venture between CH2M Hill Engineers, Inc. and CDM Contractors, Inc. for the Northeast Water Purification Plant (NEWPP) Expansion Project and appropriate funds.

<u>Project Notice/Justification</u>: This project is required to meet regulatory mandates of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and the Harris-Galveston Subsidence District Groundwater Reduction Plan.

Under the second supplements, approved on February 18, 2015, under Ordinances No. 2015-137, 2015-138, 2015-139, and 2015-140, between the City and Authorities, the City will be responsible for approximately 16% of the total cost for the NEWPP expansion, and the Authorities will be responsible for the remainder. It is intended that the NEWPP expansion be completed in two phases. The first phase of 80 million gallons of water per day will be substantially complete no later than August 31, 2021 and the second phase of 240 million gallons of water per day to be substantially complete no later than June 30, 2024 for a total of 320 million gallons of water per day. This project was described and briefed to the Transportation, Technology, and Infrastructure (TTI) Committee on December 11, 2017.

**Description/Scope:** The planning and design phase determined that some of the construction work would be completed as Early Work Packages to meet project milestones. EWP2A consists of the construction of the West Filter Module 1 structure, the 84-inch combined filter effluent piping from the filter module structure to the Transfer Pump Station 1 (TPS1), and the TPS1 structure.

Location: This project is located at 12121 North Sam Houston Parkway East, in Humble, Key Map Grids 376 Z & 377 W.

Project History and Scope: City Council approved the Design-Build Services Contract between the City and Houston Waterworks Team (HWT) on December 9, 2015 under Ordinance No. 2015-1260 appropriating \$3,288,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 1 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on November 16, 2016 under Ordinance No. 2016-875 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$14,950,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 2 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on March 29, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-231 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$3,000,000,00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 3 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on May 24, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-378 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$66,300,000.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 4 to the Design-Build Agreement was approved on December 19, 2017 under the Ordinance No. 2017-1017 appropriating additional funds in the amount of \$37,339,594.00 to the expansion project.

Amendment No. 6 to the Design-Build Agreement was initiated in July 2017 when the HWT requested interested construction companies to complete a prequalification package for Early Work Package 2A (EWP2A). HWT reviewed those qualifications and sent a Request for Proposal to three major subcontractors including Alberici Constructors, Kiewit Water Facilities South, and McCarthy Building Companies. Competitive Sealed Proposal method was used to procure the contractor for EWP2A. HWT evaluated each proposal independently. Each contractor was then interviewed by HWT with the City and an Authority representative as observers. Following the interviews, HWT and the City convened for a final evaluation and scoring of the proposals on a consensus basis. McCarthy Building Companies, Inc. (McCarthy) was chosen as the major subcontractor to perform the work for EWP2A.

Project Cost: The total Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) of \$45,515,774.00 includes the direct construction cost of \$34,137,536.00 for EWP2, the indirect construction cost of \$9,671,361.00, and a management reserve of \$1,706,877.00. The major items for indirect construction costs include the cost of \$887,156.00 for the performance and payment bonds, the cost of \$861,304.00 for the engineering services during construction, and the cost of \$3,948,000.00 for the construction allowances for items currently under design.

The City of Houston's total contribution is \$5,052,646.32. The Water Authorities will contribute \$40,463,127.68.

Pay or Play Program: The proposed contract requires compliance with the City's 'Pay or Play' ordinance regarding health benefits for employees of City contractors. In this case, the consultant provides health benefits to eligible employees in compliance with City policy.

#### **M/WBE Information:**

a. M/WBE-Construction: The Capacity Study performed for EWP2 showed an 8% capacity for M/WBE participation for direct construction costs. Currently, the proposed amount of participation from the Design-Builder (Houston Waterworks Team) is 11.55%.

b. Included in the indirect costs is the construction allowance of \$3,948,000.00 for items that are in the design phase such as the expansion of Waterworks Way Boulevard, the purchase of additional lime treated soils, additional flowable concrete, additional rebar, and the purchase of Permeability Reducing Admixture Hydrostatic (PRAH). When the design is complete, the Project Director will authorize the use of these funds for construction. However, although the final amount for construction is not yet determined, it is anticipated that the construction and purchase of the allowance items will increase the M/WBE participation for direct construction costs.

c. Early Work Package 1 (EWP1) was approved on December 19, 2017 under Ordinance No. 2017-1017 with an M/WBE goal of 80,45% of the direct construction costs. Construction has recently commenced and M/WBE data is not available yet.

d. Early Work Package 4 (EWP4) is scheduled to be on Council Agenda on February 21, 2018 and has an M/WBE goal of 15% of the direct construction costs. Construction has not commenced and M/WBE data is not available yet.

e. M/WBE-Design: The status of the design for this project is 30% complete. The original contract amount previously appropriated to design this project totals \$85,134,000.00. The consultant has been paid \$23,835,693.60(28%) to date. Of this amount, \$7,829,584.77 (32.85%) has been paid to M/WBE sub-consultants to date. The design goal for this project is 24%. Currently, this project is exceeding the design goal.

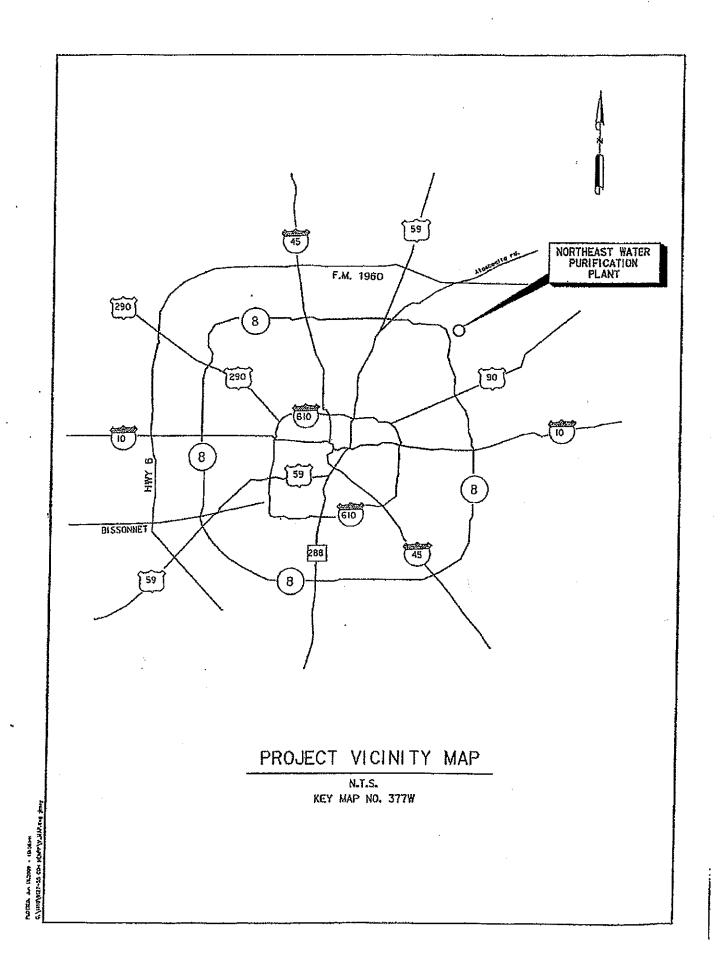

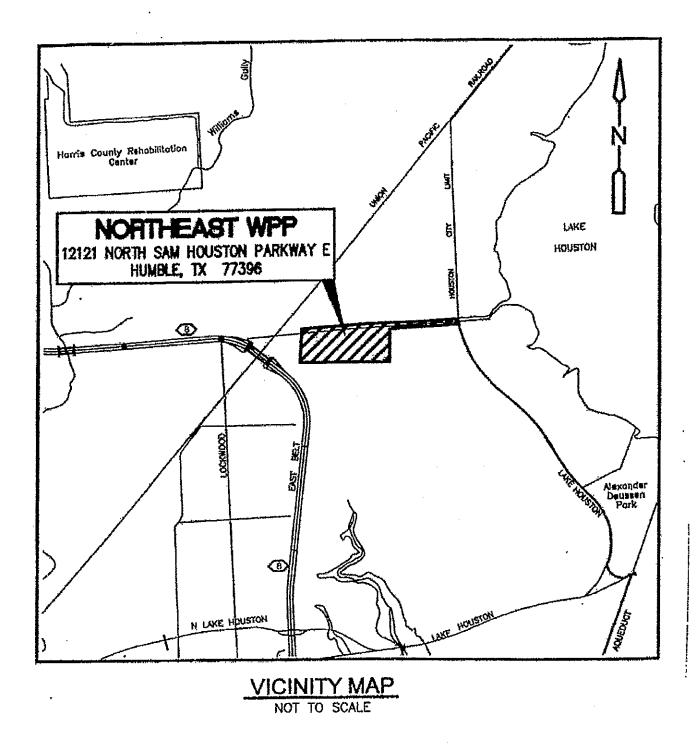

Justification:

Based on the Department's analysis of the impacts of Harvey, the proposed changes to Chapter 19 are justified:

- A third of the homes in the 500-year floodplain were impacted by Harvey as compared to 19% of homes outside of the 100-year and 500-year floodplain. This indicates that there is significant flooding risk in the 500-year floodplain that should be mitigated through regulation of development.
- Pending federal rainfall and flooding studies will increase the base rainfall intensity numbers for the Houston area which will result in higher 100-year flood elevations and a larger 100year floodplain. These regulations in today's 100-year and 500-year floodplains anticipate these changes by adding protective standards for areas of future conditions flood hazard in this interim period.
- Current floodplain regulations were inadequate to protect even compliant homes from flooding in Harvey. Almost five thousand (4,788) homes built to one foot above the 100-year flood elevation in the 100-year floodplain flooded in Harvey. Three thousand (3,094) of these homes were outside of the areas impacted by the reservoir releases.
- Excluding the homes impacted by the reservoir releases, 90% of homes that flooded in Harvey would have been protected if they were built 2 feet above the 500-year flood elevation
- Building homes at the higher elevation than the proposed changes require will be somewhat more expensive than building to the current standards. The higher construction costs are more than offset by insurance savings and the avoided cost of flooding. Based on numbers from the Housing and Community Development Department, which is having homes constructed with elevated floor levels, the additional cost in an example was about \$11,000.

### Location:

The proposed revisions to Chapter 19 impact the 100-year and 500-year floodplains city wide.

## **Recommendations:**

It is recommended that City Council adopt an ordinance approving revisions to Chapter 19. The proposed revisions expand the regulated area to the 500-year floodplain, increases the elevation requirement for structures from 1 foot (in 100-year only) to 2 feet above the 500-year flood elevation, and extends the no net fill provision to the 500-year floodplain.

## HOUSTON PUBLIC WORKS CHAPTER 19 FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE SUMMARY

#### **SUMMARY**

The City of Houston is considering revisions to Chapter 19 to ensure new dwellings are built high enough to save lives and property in the event of flooding. Chapter 19 regulates flood protection in specific areas.

### **APPROACH**

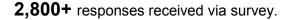
The City of Houston will reduce the risk of flood loss for future development and redevelopment by ordinance revisions, new regulations, building codes and design guidelines. Existing development will be improved through capital improvement projects, buyouts, home elevations and demo-rebuilds.

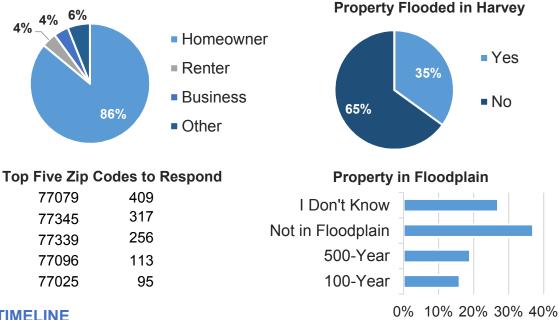
### RECOMMENDATIONS

Houston's current code only applies to property in the 100-year floodplain and protects one foot above 100-year flood elevation. The proposed revisions would include property in the 500-year floodplain and protect two feet above 500-year flood elevation. It would also include no net fill in the 500-year floodplain.

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

### What is the floodplain and how do I know if I am in one?

The 100-year floodplain is land that is predicted to flood during a 100-year storm (13-14 inches of rain in 24 hours) and has a 1% chance of occurring in any given year. The 500-year floodplain has a 0.2% chance of occurring (17-19 inches of rain in 24 hours). 31% of Houston is in the 100-year floodplain. ### Would changes to Chapter 19 impact my existing property?

Changes would NOT impact existing property in the 500-year floodplain unless an addition exceeding 1/3 the total footprint of the structure is added. Changes would NOT impact existing property in the 100-year floodplain unless the property is substantially improved, an addition of any size is added, or the property is substantially damaged in a future flood event.

#### Does Chapter 19 impact anyone outside the 100-year or 500-year floodplain?

This Ordinance does not apply outside the 100-year or 500-year floodplain. However, land outside the floodplain can still be at risk of flooding and land inside the floodplains may flood more often. The City of Houston is actively looking at ways to reduce the risk of flood loss and protect dwellings outside the 500-year floodplain that is not included in Chapter 19.

#### Does the City plan to redraw existing floodplains based on current flood data?

Harris County Flood Control District in partnership with FEMA is the lead on redrawing floodplain maps in Harris County.

### What else is being done to prevent flooding?

The City of Houston is working with the county, state and federal government on funding and approvals for bayou expansions, a third reservoir in Houston and more floodwater retention/storage strategies.

#### Why two feet?

Current regulations are not protective enough. 31% of homes built in the 100-year floodplain under the current rules flooded in Harvey. In addition, the City's study shows 84% of structures in the 100 and 500-year floodplains would not have flooded if the proposed changes were in place prior to Harvey.

## Why did the City of Houston let so many structures be built in the flood plains?

The 100-year floodplain was identified, mapped and classified in 1981, after 79% of the structures were built.

## Will this impact the overall cost of new homes in the future?

Elevation to new construction is estimated to cost slightly more than traditional slab on grade. Building higher means construction would cost slightly more, but the potential cost for future damage from flooding would be much higher.

## Will this impact the cost of flood insurance or value of existing homes?

Proposed changes will not impact the cost of flood insurance for existing homes. According to the FEMA Flood Insurance Manual, elevating a home to the 500-year +2 feet as compared to the 100-year flood elevation +1 foot will save about 30% on flood insurance premiums.

## What is net fill and why is zero net fill important?

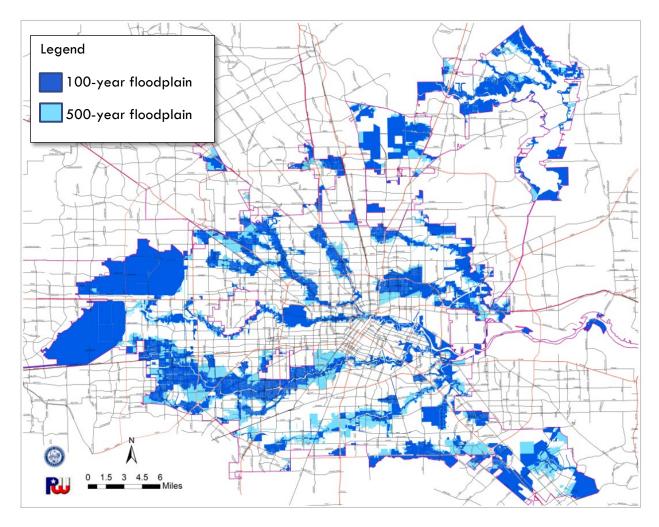
Net fill is the amount of solid building materials such as soil, dirt or concrete added to a property as compared to the amount of building materials removed. Zero net fill is important because it protects the area in the floodplain available to store flood water and maintains neighborhood drainage patterns. This will help prevent run-off from new property to existing property.

## What will be done to enforce changes?

New construction requires city permits, which will be given only to structures in compliance with city codes. The city has the legal power to stop construction that violates the codes.

## What is the difference between impacted and flooded?

**Impacted** = suffered damage from wind, rain or floodwaters during Hurricane Harvey. **Flooded** = suffered damage from rainwater or floodwaters during Hurricane Harvey.
